

MASTER SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR BASE CAMP AND LOGISTICS SERVICES

THIS MASTER SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR BASE CAMP AND LOGISTICS SERVICES (the “Agreement”) is made on this date the 1st of June, 2026 (the “Effective Date”) by and between _____ (the “Contractor”), and each of the Participating Members that have executed this Agreement at Section 42. Each Participating Member and Contractor are referred to in this Agreement individually as a “Party” or collectively as the “Parties.”

The Parties, intending to be legally bound, covenant, and agree to the terms herein.

Section 1. DEFINITIONS

In addition to the words and terms defined elsewhere in this Agreement, the following terms have the meanings set out below:

- A. "Agreement" means, in controlling order: (1) any written amendments to this contract executed by all Participating Members that are Party to this Agreement and Contractor; (2) this contract between the Parties; (3) all exhibits to this contract; (4) Contractor's Proposal submitted in response to Request for Proposals.
- B. "Contractor" refers to _____, including its successors and assigns.
- C. "Day(s)" means calendar day, including weekends and legal holidays, whether capitalized or not, unless otherwise specifically provided. In the case of plural "days", those days will be consecutive.
- D. "Effective Date" means the date first set forth above.
- E. "Party" or "Parties" means each Participating Member and Contractor who are bound by this Agreement, individually or collectively as indicated in the context by which it appears.
- F. "Services" means all services required by or reasonably inferable from the Agreement including all labor, materials, tools, supplies, equipment, transportation, mobilization and demobilization, insurance, subcontracts, supervision, management, reports, incidentals, quality control, and other items necessary or incidental to fulfilling Contractor's obligations.
- G. "Subcontractor", whether capitalized or not, means any person or entity with whom the Contractor contracts to provide any part of the goods, services, or work to be provided by Contractor under this Agreement, including subcontractors of any tier, suppliers, and material men, whether or not in privity with the Contractor.
- H. "Task Release" means written authorizations to commence work that will define the scope of work, objective, location, completion timeframe, rates, and other useful information necessary for the Contractor to begin work.
- I. "Term" means the entire period during which this Agreement is in effect, starting on the Effective Date and continuing through the final date of termination or expiration of this Agreement, including any renewals or extensions.
- J. "Participating Member(s)" refers to PowerSouth Energy Cooperative or each of those PowerSouth electric distribution members that have executed this Agreement at Section 42, including their successors and assigns.

K. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words used in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular include the plural.

L. The word “shall” is always mandatory and not merely permissive.

Section 2. SCOPE OF SERVICES

A. In consideration of the payments specified in this Agreement, Contractor agrees to provide all labor, material as requested, and supervision necessary to perform the services described in Exhibit A (the “Services”), as requested by any Participating Member. Any Participating Member may request performance of Services by issuing a Task Release as described in Section 3, below.

Section 3. TASK RELEASES

A. This Agreement describes the terms and conditions under which Services will be performed by Contractor. Contractor will be authorized to commence the provision of Services by any Participating Member’s issuance of one or more Task Releases to Contractor. A Participating Member who issues a Task Release pursuant to this Agreement is referred to herein as the “issuing Member.” In the event multiple Participating Members issue Task Releases to Contractor for the provision of Services which together are beyond Contractor’s capacity to perform, Contractor shall make a good faith determination as to which Task Release(s) it will accept and notify each issuing Member as soon as possible. In making this determination, Contractor shall take all reasonable efforts to maximize its capacity.

B. Each Task Release will describe the specific scope of Services to be performed, specify the rates to be charged consistent with this Agreement, include a price ceiling the Contractor exceeds at its own risk if the work is performed on an hourly rate basis, and specify the time period for performance, among other things. Unless otherwise directed by the issuing Member in writing, Contractor shall not commence work under this Agreement until the issuing Member and Contractor have executed a Task Release.

C. Each Task Release shall take the form substantially similar to Exhibit B, attached hereto. Upon execution by the issuing Member and Contractor, each Task Release shall become a part of this Agreement as to the issuing Member and Contractor only, and subject to the terms and conditions herein. Any changes or modifications to an executed Task Release, including to the Services to be performed or method, price, or schedule of same may only be made in accordance with Section 22, Amendments and Change Orders, unless the issuing Member and Contractor otherwise agree in writing.

D. Where the terms of a Task Release conflict with the terms of this Agreement, the Task Release prevails.

- E. In situations where a Participating Member has established agreements with multiple contractors performing the same work or services described in this Agreement, the Participating Member may give preference to one or more contractors based on a determination of best value to Participating Member, which will include an evaluation of factors as described in the Request for Proposals under which the agreements were awarded. Each Participating Member reserves the right to issue a Task Release to a contractor other than the lowest priced offeror based on such determinations.

Section 4. PAYMENT TERMS

- A. An issuing Member shall pay, and Contractor shall accept, the fees set forth in Exhibit C as full compensation for all Services rendered by Contractor pursuant to a Task Release issued under this Agreement. Invoices shall be submitted to the issuing Member's designated employee on a monthly basis unless otherwise indicated in the applicable Task Release. All invoices must be submitted with a hard copy of the invoice and an electronic copy (Microsoft Excel format) of the invoice detail. Invoice details will be verified by the issuing Member's designated employee before being paid. Payments shall be due 30 days after issuing Member's receipt and approval of Contractor's detailed invoice showing Services provided during the invoice period.
- B. A ten percent (10%) retainage will be withheld by the issuing Member from each invoice until the Contractor's completion of the work described in the applicable Task Release. In order to release the retainage, Contractor must successfully complete the scope of the applicable Task Release and receive a letter of completion from the issuing Member, which will be issued upon final reconciliation of the amount due. Portions of the retainage may be held by the issuing Member to repair damages caused by the Contractor to the issuing Member's property.
- C. Issuing Member may reject a payment request or invoice in writing within 20 business days after the date on which the payment request or invoice is stamped as received, which shall specify the deficiency and the action necessary to correct the deficiency and to make the payment request or invoice proper. Payment of a corrected payment request or invoice, or rejection thereof, shall be made 20 business days after the date the corrected payment request or invoice is stamped as received.
- D. If an issuing Member disputes an invoice submitted by Contractor for any reason, including lack of supporting documentation (as may be required by the issuing Member in its sole discretion), that issuing Member shall temporarily delete the disputed item(s) and approve and pay the remainder of the invoice. The issuing Member shall promptly notify Contractor of the dispute and request remedial action. After the dispute is settled, Contractor shall include the settled amount, if any, on a subsequent regularly scheduled invoice or on a special invoice for the disputed item(s) only.

- E. Issuing Member may decline to make payment, may withhold funds, and, if necessary, may demand the return of some or all of the amounts it previously paid to Contractor, to protect the issuing Member from loss because of:
 - i. Defective work not remedied by the Contractor or, in the opinion of the issuing Member, not likely to be remedied by the Contractor;
 - ii. Claims of third parties against the issuing Member or the issuing Member's property;
 - iii. Failure by Contractor to pay subcontractors or others in a prompt and proper fashion;
 - iv. Evidence that the balance of the work cannot be completed in accordance with the Agreement or at the agreed rates in Exhibit C;
 - v. Evidence that the work will not be completed in the time required as indicated in the applicable Task Release;
 - vi. Recurring or persistent failure to carry out the Services in accordance with the Agreement;
 - vii. Damage to the issuing Member or a third party to whom the issuing Member is, or may be, liable; or
 - viii. Recurring or persistent failure to submit required reports or other information requested by issuing Member.
- F. In the event that an issuing Member makes written demand upon Contractor for amounts previously paid by that issuing Member as contemplated in this Section, Contractor shall promptly comply with such demand.
- G. Issuing Members shall have no duty to third parties to withhold payment to Contractor and shall incur no liability for a failure to withhold funds.

Section 5. TAXES

- A. Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all sales taxes on materials and equipment furnished by Contractor as part of the Services and shall not seek reimbursement from any Participating Member for such taxes. Provided however, Contractor may charge Participating Members sales taxes applicable to Contractor's own Services only to the extent permitted under State law. Upon request from any Participating Member, Contractor must provide support for the applicability of any taxes charged to the Participating Member.

Section 6. NO QUANTITY GUARANTEE

- A. This Agreement does not create an exclusive right to Contractor to perform all services concerning the subject of this Agreement. Each Participating Member may procure and execute contracts with other firms for the same, similar, or additional services as those set forth in this Agreement or any Task Release.
- B. Participating Members make no express or implied representations, warranties, or guarantees whatsoever, that any particular quantity, type, task area, or dollar amount of services will be procured or purchased from Contractor through this Agreement or any Task Release; nor do Participating Members make any express or implied representations, warranties, or guarantees whatsoever, for the amount or value of revenue that Contractor may ultimately derive from or through this Agreement or any Task Release.

Section 7. CONTRACTOR'S PERSONNEL

- A. Contractor shall replace any of its personnel or subcontractors whose performance, work, or work product under a Task Release is deemed unsatisfactory at the issuing Member's discretion.

Section 8. SUBCONTRACTS

- A. Contractor shall require written subcontracts with all subcontractors and suppliers.
- B. Contractor is responsible for payment to all subcontractors utilized to render Services under a Task Release. Contractor shall execute release waivers with all subcontractors to release the issuing Member from payment to subcontractors directly. The release waivers for all subcontractors shall be provided to the issuing Member prior to payment to Contractor.

Section 9. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold each Participating Member, its officers, agents, and employees harmless from any and all losses, liabilities, damages, claims, demands, suits, actions, proceedings, subrogations, and expenses, including court costs and reasonable attorneys' fees arising from this Agreement, or the services performed or goods delivered under this Agreement, which are claimed or made by any person, firm, association or corporation, including employees, workmen, servants or agents of Contractor and its subcontractors, whether or not due in whole or in part to conditions, acts, or omissions done or permitted by any Participating Member. Contractor further agrees to promptly assume full responsibility for the defense of any and all such suits, actions, or proceedings which may be brought against Contractor or against any Participating Member. In the event a Participating Member's machinery or equipment is used by Contractor in the performance of any work that might be required under a Task Release, such machinery or equipment shall be considered as being under the sole custody and control of Contractor during the period of such use by Contractor.

- B. To the extent § 725.06, Florida Statutes, is applicable to this Agreement or a Task Release issued hereunder, the following applies:
- i. The indemnification under this Section is limited to the required coverages provided in Section 11, Insurance;
 - ii. The indemnification under this Section does not require that the indemnitor indemnify the indemnitee for damages to persons or property caused in whole or in part by any act, omission, or default of a party other than the indemnitor; any of the indemnitor's contractors, subcontractors, sub-subcontractors, materialmen, or agents of any tier or their respective employees; or the indemnitee or its officers, directors, agents, or employees;
 - iii. The indemnification under this Section shall not include claims of, or damages resulting from, gross negligence, or willful, wanton or intentional misconduct of the indemnitee or its officers, directors, agents or employees, or for statutory violation or punitive damages except and to the extent the statutory violation or punitive damages are caused by or result from the acts or omissions of the indemnitor or any of the indemnitor's contractors, subcontractors, sub-subcontractors, materialmen, or agents of any tier or their respective employees.

Section 10. **INSURANCE**

- A. Contractor shall take out and maintain, and shall require any subcontractor to take out and maintain, throughout the period of this Agreement, insurance of the following minimum types and amounts to protect the Contractor and the issuing Member:
- i. As soon as possible, but no less than 48 hours after issuance of a Task Release, Contractor shall furnish each issuing Member a Certificate of Insurance issued to the issuing Member for "Any and all work performed". The Certificate of Insurance must indicate the issuing Member as an Additional Insured with Waiver of Subrogation on the General Liability and Auto policies and a Waiver of Subrogation on the Workers Comp. The Certificate of Insurance must state the name of insurer, policy number, expiration date, limits of liability and provide at least 30 days' written notice of cancellation. Insurance shall be primary and noncontributory over any other insurance available. All policies should be written by an insurance company with an AM Best rating of A-VIII. The policy number shall be referenced on all endorsements. Blanket Endorsements accepted.
 - ii. Commercial General Liability Insurance, including Contractual Liability, Completed/Products, Broad Form Property Damage, and Contractors Protective Liability, if subcontractors are used. Minimum limits Bodily Injury, including Death and Property Damage, \$1,000,000 each occurrence and \$2,000,000 General Aggregate and Products/Comp Aggregate. As soon as possible, but no less than 48 hours after issuance of a Task Release, the issuing Member shall be provided an ADDITIONAL

INSURED ENDORSEMENT per CG 20 10, or equivalent, and per CG 20 37, or equivalent, and a WAIVER OF SUBROGATION ENDORSEMENT in favor of the issuing Member. Blanket Endorsements accepted.

- iii. Automotive Liability including Owned, Non-owned, and Hired Vehicles: Minimum Limits-Bodily Injury \$1,000,000 each person, \$1,000,000 each occurrence, and property damage \$1,000,000 each occurrence. As soon as possible, but no less than 48 hours after issuance of a Task Release, the issuing Member shall be given an endorsement naming the issuing Member as an ADDITIONAL INSURED per form CA 20 48, or equivalent, and a WAIVER OF SUBROGATION ENDORSEMENT in favor of the issuing Member. Blanket Endorsements accepted.
- B. Worker's Compensation Statutory Limits, for State(s) in which work will be performed including Longshoreman's coverage if applicable and Employers' Liability of \$1,000,000 each accident, \$1,000,000 disease-each employee and \$1,000,000 disease-policy limits. Please indicate on certificate if the policy covers AL & FL. As soon as possible, but no less than 48 hours after issuance of a Task Release, the issuing Member shall be provided a WAIVER OF SUBROGATION ENDORSEMENT per WC 00 03 13, or equivalent, in favor of the issuing Member. Blanket Endorsements accepted.
- C. Each issuing Member shall have the right at any time to require general liability insurance and property damage liability insurance greater than those limits required in paragraphs (A)(ii) and (A)(iii) of this Section. In any such event, the additional insurance premium or premiums payable solely as the result of such additional insurance shall be added to the Task Release price.
- D. All insurance required by this Section shall be primary over any other insurance coverage available to the issuing Member.
- E. Any Participating Member's failure to demand either a certificate of insurance or written endorsement required by this provision is not a waiver of Contractor's obligations to obtain the required insurance.

Section 11. BONDING

- A. Upon execution of a Task Release estimated to be in excess of \$350,000 for construction, rehabilitation, alteration, conversion, extension, demolition or repair of buildings, highways, or other changes or improvements to real property, including facilities providing utility services, or the supervision, inspection, and other onsite functions incidental to the actual construction, the following bonding requirements apply:
 - i. A performance bond on the part of the Contractor for one hundred percent (100%) of the not-to-exceed amount indicated in the Task Release or, if none, the estimated total cost of the Services to be performed under the Task Release, as indicated by the issuing Member. A "performance bond" is one executed in connection with a contract to

secure the fulfillment of all the contractor's obligations under such contract. The Surety shall be responsible for liquidated damages assessed for failure to complete the Services required by the Agreement and any Task Release(s). The Surety shall also be responsible for any increase or extension to the Agreement.

- ii. A payment bond on the part of the Contractor for one hundred percent (100%) of the not-to-exceed amount indicated in the Task Release or, if none, the estimated total cost of the Services to be performed under the Task Release, as indicated by the issuing Member. A "payment bond" is one executed in connection with a contract to assure payment as required by law of all persons supplying labor and material in the execution of the work provided for in the contract.

Section 12. PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

- A. Contractor shall take reasonable precautions for the safety of, and shall provide all reasonable protection to prevent damage, injury, or loss to, its employees on the job, and others. Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local safety laws, insurance requirements, standard industry practices, the requirements of the operations, and the Agreement. Contractor, directly or through its subcontractors, shall erect and properly maintain at all times, as required by the conditions and progress of the work, necessary safeguards for safety and protection of the public, including securing areas, posting danger signs, placards, labels, or posting other forms of warnings against hazards. When use of hazardous materials or equipment or unusual methods are necessary for execution of the work, or when the work includes the cleanup, remediation and/or removal of bio-solids, biohazards waste, or any hazardous or toxic materials, trash, debris, refuse, or waste, Contractor, its subcontractor(s), and their employees shall be trained and certified as required in the proper handling, use, and care of equipment, materials, and hazardous operations, and shall exercise utmost care and perform such activities under the supervision of properly qualified and competent personnel.
- B. Contractor shall promptly remedy damage and loss to property caused in whole or in part by Contractor, its subcontractors of every tier, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts they may be liable.

Section 13. LICENSES AND PERMITS

Contractor shall obtain, maintain, and pay for all licenses, permits, and certificates including all professional licenses required by any statute, ordinance, rule, or regulation for performance of the Services. Contractor shall immediately notify Participating Members of any suspension, revocation, or other detrimental action against any such license, permit, or certificate.

Section 14. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

- A. Contractor acknowledges that Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") financial assistance will be used to fund all or a portion of this Agreement. Contractor shall comply

with all applicable local, state, and federal laws, regulations, executive orders, FEMA policies, procedures, and directives.

- B. Contractor shall not use the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (“DHS”) seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials. This includes use of DHS component (e.g., FEMA, CISA, etc.) seals, logos, crests, or reproductions of flags, or likenesses of component officials.
- C. The Federal Government is not a party to this Agreement and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to Participating Members, the Contractor, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the Agreement.
- D. Contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. Chap. 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to Contractor’s actions pertaining to this Agreement.

Section 15. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION

- A. The Agreement is a covered transaction for purposes of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180 and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000. As such, Contractor is required to verify that none of the Contractor’s principals (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.995) or its affiliates (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.905) are excluded (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.940) or disqualified (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.935).
- B. Contractor shall comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C, and must include a requirement to comply with these regulations in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into.
- C. Contractor has provided a certification regarding debarment and suspension to Participating Members. This certification is a material representation of fact relied upon by Participating Members. If it is later determined that Contractor did not comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C, in addition to remedies available to Participating Members, the Federal Government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/or debarment.

Section 16. BYRD ANTI-LOBBYING AMENDMENT

- A. Contractor has signed and provided to Participating Members a Certification Regarding Lobbying consistent with APPENDIX A, 44 C.F.R. PART 18.
- B. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used federally appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Each tier shall also disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the recipient who in turn will forward the certification(s) to the federal awarding agency.

Section 17. RESERVED

Section 18. CONTRACT WORK AND SAFETY STANDARDS

To the extent this Agreement involves the employment by Contractor or any of its subcontractors of mechanics or laborers, the following provisions apply:

- A. Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.
- B. Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in subparagraph (A) of this Section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages and interest from the date of the underpayment. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchpersons and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in subparagraph (A) of this Section, in the sum of \$33 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in subparagraph (A) of this Section.
- C. Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages.
 - i. *Withholding process.* Participating Member may, upon its own action, or must, upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor, withhold or cause to be withheld, from the contractor so much of the accrued payments or advances as may be considered necessary to satisfy the liabilities of the prime contractor or any subcontractor for any unpaid wages; monetary relief, including interest; and liquidated damages required by the clauses set forth in this Section on this Agreement, any other federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act that is held by the same prime contractor (as defined in 29 C.F.R. § 5.2). The necessary funds may be withheld from the contractor under this Agreement, any other federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract that is subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act and is held by the same prime contractor, regardless of whether the other contract was awarded or assisted by the same agency, and such funds may be used to satisfy the contractor liability for which the funds were withheld.

- ii. *Priority to withheld funds.* The Department has priority to funds withheld or to be withheld in accordance with paragraph 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(a)(2)(i) or paragraph(C)(i) of this Section, or both, over claims to those funds by:
 - a. A contractor's surety(ies), including without limitation performance bond sureties and payment bond sureties;
 - b. A contracting agency for its procurement costs;
 - c. A trustee(s) (either a court-appointed trustee or a U.S. trustee, or both) in bankruptcy of a contractor, or a contractor's bankruptcy estate;
 - d. A contractor's assignee(s);
 - e. A contractor's successor(s); or
 - f. A claim asserted under the Prompt Payment Act, 31 U.S.C. 3901-3907.
- D. Subcontracts. Contractor must insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in this Section and a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor is responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in this Section. In the event of any violations of these clauses, the prime contractor, and any subcontractor(s) responsible will be liable for any unpaid wages and monetary relief, including interest from the date of the underpayment or loss, due to any workers of lower-tier subcontractors, and associated liquidated damages and may be subject to debarment, as appropriate.
- C. Anti-retaliation. It is unlawful for any person to discharge, demote, intimidate, threaten, restrain, coerce, blacklist, harass, or in any other manner discriminate against, or to cause any person to discharge, demote, intimidate, threaten, restrain, coerce, blacklist, harass, or in any other manner discriminate against, any worker or job applicant for:
 - i. Notifying any contractor of any conduct which the worker reasonably believes constitutes a violation of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (CWHSSA) or its implementing regulations in this part;
 - ii. Filing any complaint, initiating or causing to be initiated any proceeding, or otherwise asserting or seeking to assert on behalf of themselves or others any right or protection under CWHSSA or this part; or
 - iii. Informing any other person about their rights under CWHSSA or this part.
- D. Further Compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.
 - i. The contractor or subcontractor must maintain regular payrolls and other basic records during the course of the work and must preserve them for a period of three years after

all the work on the prime contract is completed for all laborers and mechanics, including guards and watchpersons, working on the contract. Such records must contain the name; last known address, telephone number, and email address; and social security number of each such worker; each worker's correct classification(s) of work performed; hourly rates of wages paid; daily and weekly number of hours actually worked; deductions made; and actual wages paid.

- ii. Records to be maintained under this provision must be made available by the contractor or subcontractor for inspection, copying, or transcription by authorized representatives of the Department of Homeland Security, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the Department of Labor, and the contractor or subcontractor will permit such representatives to interview workers during working hours on the job.

Section 19. ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE

- A. Contractor shall comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq., and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 § et seq.
- B. Contractor shall report each violation to the Participating Members and understands and understands and agrees that the Participating Members will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to FEMA and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
- C. Contractor shall include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by FEMA.

Section 20. DOMESTIC PREFERENCE REQUIREMENTS

Contractor should, to the greatest extent practicable and consistent with law, provide a preference for the purchase, acquisition, or use of goods, products, or materials produced in the United States. This includes, but is not limited to, iron, aluminum, steel, cement, and other manufactured products. The requirements of this Section must be included in all subcontracts and purchase orders for work or products under this Agreement. For purposes of this Section: *Produced in the United States* means, for iron and steel products, that all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States.

Section 21. PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND VIDEO SURVEILLANCE SERVICES OR EQUIPMENT

- A. *Definitions.* As used in this clause, the terms backhaul; covered foreign country; covered telecommunications equipment or services; interconnection arrangements; roaming; substantial or essential component; and telecommunications equipment or services have

the meaning as defined in FEMA Policy #405-143-1 Prohibitions on Expending FEMA Award Funds for Covered Telecommunications Equipment or Services.

B. Prohibitions.

- i. Section 889(b) of the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2019, Pub. L. No. 115-232, and 2 C.F.R. § 200.216 prohibit the head of an executive agency on or after Aug. 13, 2020, from obligating or expending grant, cooperative agreement, loan, or loan guarantee funds on certain telecommunications products or from certain entities for national security reasons.
- ii. Unless an exception in paragraph C of this Section applies, the Contractor and its subcontractors may not use grant, cooperative agreement, loan, or loan guarantee funds from FEMA to:
 - a. Procure or obtain any equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of any system;
 - b. Enter into, extend, or renew a contract to procure or obtain any equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of any system;
 - c. Enter into, extend, or renew contracts with entities that use covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system; or
 - d. Provide, as part of its performance of this contract, subcontract, or other contractual instrument, any equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system.

C. Exceptions.

- i. This clause does not prohibit contractors from providing—
 - a. A service that connects to the facilities of a third-party, such as backhaul, roaming, or interconnection arrangements; or
 - b. Telecommunications equipment that cannot route or redirect user data traffic or permit visibility into any user data or packets that such equipment transmits or otherwise handles.
- ii. By necessary implication and regulation, the prohibitions also do not apply to:

- a. Covered telecommunications equipment or services that:
 - (1) Are not used as a substantial or essential component of any system; and
 - (2) Are not used as critical technology of any system.
- b. Other telecommunications equipment or services that are not considered covered telecommunications equipment or services.

D. Reporting requirement.

- i. In the event the Contractor identifies covered telecommunications equipment or services used as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system, during contract performance, or the Contractor is notified of such by a subcontractor at any tier or by any other source, the Contractor shall report the information in paragraph (D)(ii) of this Section to the Participating Members, unless elsewhere in this Agreement are established procedures for reporting the information.
- ii. The Contractor shall report the following information pursuant to paragraph (D)(i) of this Section:
 - a. Within one business day from the date of such identification or notification: The contract number; the order number(s), if applicable; supplier name; supplier unique entity identifier (if known); supplier Commercial and Government Entity (CAGE) code (if known); brand; model number (original equipment manufacturer number, manufacturer part number, or wholesaler number); item description; and any readily available information about mitigation actions undertaken or recommended.
 - b. Within 10 business days of submitting the information in paragraph (D)(ii)(a) of this Section: Any further available information about mitigation actions undertaken or recommended. In addition, the Contractor shall describe the efforts it undertook to prevent use or submission of covered telecommunications equipment or services, and any additional efforts that will be incorporated to prevent future use or submission of covered telecommunications equipment or services.

- E. *Subcontracts.* The Contractor shall insert the substance of this clause, including this paragraph (E), in all subcontracts and other contractual instruments.

Section 22. AMENDMENTS AND CHANGE ORDERS

- A. Unless otherwise specified elsewhere in this Agreement, all modifications of this Agreement may only be made by written amendment executed by the Parties (all signatory Participating Members and Contractor).

- B. Changes to the work required under a Task Release may be made through issuance of a Change Order, in writing, by the issuing Member. A Change Order may increase or decrease the scope of services or change plans and specifications described in the Task Order, as the issuing Member may find necessary to accomplish the general purposes of this Agreement.
 - i. Whenever a Change Order is issued and executed by both the issuing Member and the Contractor, Contractor shall furnish all material, equipment, and personnel necessary to perform the work described in the Change Order, in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement.
 - ii. Contractor shall complete the work within the time prescribed. If no time for completion is prescribed, Contractor shall complete the work within a reasonable time. If the work described in any Change Order causes an unavoidable delay in any other work Contractor is required to perform under this Agreement, Contractor may request a time extension for the completion of the work. The issuing Member's decision regarding a time extension is final.

Section 23. TERM

This Agreement is effective on the date of the Effective Date and expires one year after the Effective Date, unless sooner terminated in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

Section 24. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE BY PARTICIPATING MEMBER

- A. Any Participating Member may terminate this Agreement as to itself at any time by giving 10 days' written notice to Contractor. The terminating Member's right to terminate this Agreement for convenience is cumulative of all rights and remedies which exist now or in the future.
- B. Upon receipt of a notice of termination for convenience, Contractor shall, unless the notice directs otherwise, immediately discontinue all Services to the terminating Member under this Agreement and cancel all existing orders and subcontracts that are chargeable to this Agreement for the terminating Member. As soon as practicable after receiving the termination notice, but in no event later than 30 days following the effective date of termination, Contractor shall submit to the terminating Member a final invoice marked "FINAL" showing in detail the Services performed under this Agreement up to the termination date.
- C. TERMINATION OF THIS AGREEMENT AND RECEIPT OF PAYMENT FOR SERVICES RENDERED, IF ANY, ARE CONTRACTOR'S ONLY REMEDIES FOR A PARTICIPATING MEMBER'S TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE, WHICH DOES NOT CONSTITUTE A DEFAULT OR BREACH OF THIS AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR WAIVES ALL CLAIMS (OTHER THAN ITS CLAIM FOR PAYMENT AS SPECIFIED IN THIS SECTION) IT MAY HAVE NOW OR IN THE FUTURE FOR

FINANCIAL LOSSES OR OTHER DAMAGES RESULTING FROM A PARTICIPATING MEMBER'S TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE.

Section 25. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE BY PARTICIPATING MEMBER

- A. If Contractor defaults under this Agreement, any Participating Member may either terminate this Agreement or allow Contractor to cure the default as provided below. Each Participating Member's right to terminate this Agreement for Contractor's default is cumulative of all rights and remedies which exist now or in the future. Default by Contractor occurs if:
 - i. Contractor fails to perform any of its material duties under this Agreement;
 - ii. Contractor becomes insolvent;
 - iii. All or a substantial part of Contractor's assets are assigned for the benefit of its creditors; or
 - iv. A receiver or trustee is appointed for Contractor.
- B. If a default occurs, a terminating Member may, but is not obligated to, deliver a written notice to Contractor describing the default and the termination date. The terminating Member, at its sole option, may extend the termination date to a later date. If the terminating Member permits Contractor to cure the default and Contractor does so, to the satisfaction of the terminating Member, before the termination date, then the termination is ineffective. If Contractor does not cure the default before the termination date, then the terminating Member may terminate this Agreement on the termination date and pay Contractor for all Services performed to the satisfaction of the terminating Member, if any, through such date.
- C. To effect final termination, a terminating Member must notify Contractor in writing. After receiving the notice, Contractor shall, unless the notice directs otherwise, immediately discontinue all Services under this Agreement, and promptly cancel all orders or subcontracts chargeable to this Agreement.
- D. If a Participating Member terminates the Agreement for cause and it is subsequently determined that any such determination was improper, unwarranted, or wrongful, then any such termination shall be deemed for all purposes as a termination for convenience, without cause.

Section 26. EFFECT OF TERMINATION BY LESS THAN ALL PARTICIPATING MEMBERS

- A. A Participating Member's termination of this Agreement is effective only as to the terminating Member's contract with Contractor. The Agreement shall remain effective as to all other signatory, non-terminating Participating Members for the remainder of the contract term, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.

- B. A Participating Member that terminates this Agreement shall not be permitted to re-enter the Agreement.

Section 27. REMOVAL OF CONTRACTOR-OWNED EQUIPMENT AND MATERIALS

Upon expiration or termination of this Agreement, Contractor is permitted 10 days within which to remove Contractor-owned material and equipment from Participating Members' premises or the job site. Participating Members shall make such material and equipment readily available to Contractor. The time period may be extended upon approval by a Participating Member as to its premises. Participating Members reserve the right to deny any extension of time.

Section 28. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

Contractor shall perform its obligations under this Agreement as an independent contractor and not as an employee of any Participating Member.

Section 29. FORCE MAJEURE

- A. Timely performance by the Parties is essential to this Agreement. However, no Party is liable for delays in performing its obligations under this Agreement to the extent the delay is caused by Force Majeure that directly impacts Participating Member or Contractor. The event of Force Majeure may permit a delay in performance but does not excuse a Party's obligations to complete performance under this Agreement. Force Majeure means: fires, interruption of utility services required to perform the Services, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, ice storms, and other natural disasters, explosions, war, terrorist acts against Participating Member or Contractor, riots, court orders, and the acts of superior governmental or military authority, and which the affected Party is unable to prevent by the exercise of reasonable diligence. The term does not include any changes in general economic conditions such as inflation, interest rates, economic downturn, or other factors of general application; or an event that merely makes performance more difficult, expensive, or impractical. Force Majeure does not entitle Contractor to any reimbursement of expenses or any other payment whatsoever.
- B. This relief is not applicable unless the affected Party does the following:
 - i. uses due diligence to remove the effects of the Force Majeure as quickly as possible and to continue performance notwithstanding the Force Majeure; and
 - ii. provides the other Party with prompt written notice of the cause and its anticipated effect.
- C. The affected Participating Member will review claims that a Force Majeure that directly impacts the Participating Member or Contractor has occurred and render a written decision within seven days. The decision of the Participating Member is final.

- D. An affected Participating Member may perform contract functions itself or contract them out during periods of Force Majeure. Such performance is not a default or breach of this Agreement by the Participating Member.
- E. If the Force Majeure continues for more than five days from the date performance is affected, the affected Participating Member may terminate the applicable Task Release or the Agreement by giving seven days' written notice to Contractor. This termination is not a default or breach of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR WAIVES ANY CLAIM IT MAY HAVE FOR FINANCIAL LOSSES OR OTHER DAMAGES RESULTING FROM THE TERMINATION EXCEPT FOR AMOUNTS DUE UNDER THE AGREEMENT UP TO THE TIME THE WORK IS HALTED DUE TO FORCE MAJEURE.
- F. Contractor is not relieved from performing its obligations under this Agreement due to a strike or work slowdown of its employees. Contractor shall employ only fully trained and qualified personnel during a strike.

Section 30. SEVERABILITY

If any part of this Agreement is for any reason found to be unenforceable, all other parts remain enforceable unless the result materially prejudices the Parties.

Section 31. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement merges the prior negotiations and understandings of the Parties and embodies the entire agreement of the Parties. No other agreements, assurances, conditions, covenants (express or implied), or other terms of any kind, exist between the Parties regarding this Agreement.

Section 32. APPLICABLE LAWS

- A. This Agreement is subject to the laws of the State in which the majority of the work under a Task Release is to be performed, the laws of the federal government of the United States, and all rules and regulations of any regulatory body or officer having jurisdiction.
- B. Venue for any litigation relating to this Agreement brought by or against a Participating Member is the county in the State where the Participating Member's principal place of business is located.

Section 33. NOTICES

All notices to any Party to the Agreement must be in writing and must be delivered by hand, United States registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, United States Express Mail, Federal Express, Airborne Express, UPS, or any other national overnight express delivery service. The notice must be addressed to the Party to whom the notice is given at its address set out in Exhibit E to this Agreement or other address the receiving Party has designated previously by proper notice to the sending Party. Postage or delivery charges must be paid by the Party giving the notice.

Section 34. CAPTIONS

Captions contained in this Agreement are for reference only, and, therefore, have no effect in construing this Agreement. The captions are not restrictive of the subject matter of any section in this Agreement.

Section 35. NON-WAIVER

- A. If any Party fails to require the other to perform a term of this Agreement, that failure does not prevent the Party from later enforcing that term and all other terms. If either Party waives the other's breach of a term, that waiver does not waive a later breach of this Agreement.
- B. An approval by any Participating Member, or by any other employee or agent of any Participating Member, of any part of Contractor's performance does not waive compliance with this Agreement or establish a standard of performance other than that required by this Agreement and by law. No Participating Member is authorized to vary the terms of this Agreement.

Section 36. INSPECTIONS AND AUDITS

- A. Contractor shall provide the issuing Member, the relevant State emergency management agency, the FEMA Administrator, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their authorized representatives access to any books, documents, papers, and records of the Contractor which are directly pertinent to this Agreement for the purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions. Contractor shall keep its books, documents, papers, and records available for this purpose for at least five years after this Agreement terminates or expires. This provision does not limit the applicable statute of limitations.
- B. Contractor shall permit any of the foregoing parties to reproduce by any means whatsoever or to copy excerpts and transcriptions as reasonably needed.
- C. Contractor shall provide the FEMA Administrator or his or her authorized representatives access to construction or other work sites pertaining to the work being completed under this Agreement.
- D. In compliance with section 1225 of the Disaster Recovery Reform Act of 2018, Participating Members and the Contractor acknowledge and agree that no language in this Agreement is intended to prohibit audits or internal reviews by the FEMA Administrator or the Comptroller General of the United States.

Section 37. AMBIGUITIES

If any term of this Agreement is ambiguous, it shall not be construed for or against any Party on the basis that the Party did or did not write it.

Section 38. SURVIVAL

Contractor shall remain obligated to Participating Members under all clauses of this Agreement that expressly or by their nature extend beyond the expiration or termination of this Agreement, including but not limited to, the indemnity provisions.

Section 39. PARTIES IN INTEREST

This Agreement does not bestow any rights upon any third party, but binds and benefits Participating Members and Contractor only.

Section 40. ASSIGNMENTS

- A. Contractor shall not assign this Agreement at law or otherwise or dispose of all or substantially all of its assets without all Participating Members' prior written consent.
- B. Contractor shall not delegate any portion of its performance under this Agreement without the issuing Member's prior written consent which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Section 41. REMEDIES CUMULATIVE

Unless otherwise specified elsewhere in this Agreement, the rights and remedies contained in this Agreement are not exclusive, but are cumulative of all rights and remedies which exist now or in the future. No Party may terminate its duties under this Agreement except in accordance with its provisions.

Section 42. SIGNATURES

The Parties have executed this Agreement in multiple copies, each of which is an original. Each person signing this Agreement represents and warrants that he or she is duly authorized and has legal capacity to execute and deliver this Agreement. Each Party represents and warrants to the others that the execution and delivery of this Agreement and the performance of such Party's obligations hereunder have been duly authorized and that the Agreement is a valid and legal agreement binding on such Party and enforceable in accordance with its terms. The Parties hereby agree that each Party may sign and deliver this Agreement electronically or by electronic means and that an electronic transmittal of a signature, including but not limited to, a scanned signature page, will be as good, binding, and effective as an original signature.

EXHIBIT A: BASE CAMP AND LOGISTICS SCOPE OF SERVICES

PowerSouth is a generation and transmission electric cooperative that provides wholesale electric power to its 20 distribution members throughout Alabama and Northwest Florida. The scope of services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement includes base camp and logistics services for one or more Participating Members in the wake of a Federally declared major disaster. Where PowerSouth elects to participate in the Agreement for itself, it is also a “Participating Member.” Contractor will execute a Master Services Agreement (“Agreement”) with one or more Participating Members. If a Participating Member elects to activate Contractor under the Agreement, the Participating Member will issue a Task Release (wherein Participating Member will be referred to as an issuing Member) with the specific details of the work. The Scope of Work described below provides the full scope of services that may be requested in a Task Release; however, a Task Release may describe less than all of the services described, as required by the issuing Member’s specific needs.

I. GENERAL

After a disaster, Contractor shall furnish all supervision, labor, parts, tools, materials, equipment, supplies, and transportation necessary to provide one or more base camp locations at a capacity ranging from 150 to 1,500 individuals, depending on the issuing Member’s specific needs. The issuing Member shall provide specific information as to the available locations for the base camp site(s).

Contractor shall provide food and water, electricity, sleeping, and washing facilities as needed for the issuing Member’s employees, contractors, and Mutual Aid personnel on a temporary basis. Contractor shall be required to maintain a sanitary and healthy environment in accordance with the issuing Member’s guidelines and regulations per base camp location.

Contractor shall also furnish and maintain hand sanitizing dispensers outside the entrance to each tent or trailer and as is reasonably necessary within each tent or trailer to prevent the spread of disease, such as COVID-19. Sanitizing dispensers and hand sanitizer must be included in Contractor’s pricing and will not be separately invoiced.

II. MOBILIZATION AND DEMOBILIZATION

A. Mobilization

The base camp(s) must be fully operational within 72 hours after Contractor receives a Task Release from the issuing Member. Issuing Member and Contractor may agree on a longer or shorter activation time per the Task Release.

B. Demobilization

The issuing Member shall provide Contractor with 48-hours advanced notice that base camp services will no longer be needed and can be demobilized.

III. BASE CAMP FACILITIES

A. *Utilities*

Each base camp must be self-sufficient with regards to supplying electricity, water, and sewage services.

Contractor shall be required to furnish each base camp site with minimum voltage electrical outlets per the needs of the issuing Member. Contractor should expect to provide electrical outlets that meet the issuing Member's specific needs for any tents or trailers requested by the issuing Member (discussed below). Contractor may use the details below as a baseline for each issuing Member's minimum needs.

1. Base Camp Lighting

Contractor shall be required to furnish one outdoor light tower per 125 people per base camp location. This is a minimum requirement—more may be requested by the issuing Member. Contractor shall be required to furnish appropriate lighting and controls in all tent facilities.

2. Communications

Contractor shall be required to furnish the entire base camp with Wi-Fi Internet and cell phone capability. Contractor shall be required to furnish a portable antenna telescopic mast or other communication-type equipment as needed by the issuing Member for each base camp location. Contractor shall also furnish a public address system to cover the entire camp at each base camp location.

3. Security

Contractor shall furnish a six-foot minimum height temporary fence topped with barbed wire or razor wire around each camp as required by the issuing Member. Contractor will provide anywhere from two to four access gates for each base camp site, depending on the base camp size.

The Contractor will provide all necessary security, including:

- The Contractor will be responsible for providing security personnel on-site for purposes of patrol, maintaining order, access control, and coordinating with law enforcement on security issues. The Contractor may, if desired, independently contract directly with off-duty law enforcement personnel for all or part of these services.
- The Contractor must secure all pre-staged equipment and equipment once the site is established.
- All Contractor personnel MUST display company photo ID at all times while on the site.

- The Contractor will be required to provide photo ID for each base camp resident as they register on-site.
- The Contractor will check ID during meal periods.

B. *Registration*

Contractor will provide one registration table with two staff persons per 100 individuals expected to utilize the base camp location. Contractor staff shall check photo ID for each registrant and, if requested by issuing Member, provide a photo ID which registrants must display at all times while on site. Contractor staff shall also provide registrants bunk assignments and other important logistical information about base camp operations at the time of registration.

C. *Housing*

Contractor will provide temporary “hot bunk” accommodations for 90% of the total population being housed at each base camp location. Respondents may propose tents, trailers, or both. The below temporary accommodation specifications are subject to change by each issuing Member:

- Tent Size: Contractor and issuing Member shall agree on the appropriate size for all large, hot bunk tents depending on the size of the base camp.
- Flooring: Contractor shall provide minimum height flooring for any tent not over a concrete foundation.
- Doors: Contractor shall be required to furnish sufficient double doors on each side of the large tents as needed to facilitate the safe egress of all occupants should an evacuation be warranted.
- HVAC: Contractor shall provide heating, ventilation, and air conditioning and environmental control units for each tent.
- Lighting and Controls: Contractor shall be required to furnish appropriate lighting and controls in all tent facilities.
- Power Outlets: Contractor shall be required to furnish at least two 110 volt electrical outlets per bunk for all housing tents. The number of outlets needed and the minimum voltage for each outlet may be adjusted by issuing Member.
- Beds: In these large tent facilities, Contractor shall provide one cot for every two individuals being housed.
- Chairs: If bunk beds are used, Contractor shall also provide one chair for every upper bunk in the tent.

- Lockers: Contractor shall furnish each tent with full-size, 18-inch wide, metal wardrobe lockers with supplied keyed padlock, per person.
- Linens: Contractor shall be required to furnish all bedding including pillows.

If trailers are used, the accommodations should be comparable to that listed above.

Contractor shall provide temporary smaller tent or trailer accommodations for the remaining 10% of the population being housed at each base camp location.

- Tent Size: Each small tent should accommodate eight to ten individuals, and Contractor shall provide one cot for every individual being housed.
- Flooring: Contractor shall provide minimum height flooring for any tent not over a concrete foundation.
- Doors: Contractor shall provide at least one door per tent for the small housing tents.
- HVAC: Contractor shall provide HVAC and environmental control units for each small tent as needed by each issuing Member.
- Lighting and Controls: Contractor shall be required to furnish appropriate lighting and controls in all tent facilities.
- Power Outlets: Contractor shall be required to furnish at least two 110 volt electrical outlets per bunk for all housing tents. The number of outlets needed and the minimum voltage for each outlet may be adjusted by issuing Member.
- Chairs: If bunk beds are used, Contractor shall also provide one chair for every upper bunk in the tent.
- Lockers: Contractor shall furnish each small tent with full-size, 18-inch wide, metal wardrobe lockers with supplied keyed padlock, per person.
- Linens: Contractor shall be required to furnish all bedding including pillows.

If trailers are used, the accommodations should be comparable to that listed above.

1. Wash Stations

Contractor shall be required to furnish and maintain hand wash stations to accommodate anywhere from 150 to 1,500 persons, as indicated in the Task Release. There is a minimum of one four-spigot hand wash station per forty people per base camp site.

2. Portable Toilets

Contractor shall be required to furnish and maintain portable toilets to accommodate anywhere from 150 to 1,500 persons, as indicated in the Task Release. There is a minimum of one portable toilet for every twenty individuals.

3. Shower Trailers

The following are minimum requirements for shower-related facilities:

- One shower per ten persons.
- One sink per ten persons.
- Two towels per day and one toiletry kit per week per person. Disposable towels are not acceptable.

D. *Miscellaneous Tents or Trailers*

Contractor may be asked to provide tents or trailers to cover various services, including medical, communications, recreational, etc. Below are examples of tents Contractor may be asked to provide. Comparable trailers may be provided in the alternative where indicated. The actual tents or trailers needed to meet the issuing Member's needs may vary and will be included in a Task Release issued to Contractor. Each issuing Member will include in its Task Release a table substantially similar to the one provided below summarizing its tent needs.

1. Medical Tent

Contractor shall provide at least one 60 x 60 ft. medical tent in each base camp to treat minor ailments. Contractor should provide the medical tent with minimum height flooring if the medical tent is not over a concrete foundation, HVAC units, and lighting and controls. The medical tent should also include a minimum of twenty cots, two 110-volt electrical outlets per cot, four tables and eight chairs, and two sets of linens per cot.

Contractor shall also provide two staff members for each medical tent (e.g., licensed practical nurse or registered nurse).

2. Communications Tent or Trailer

Contractor shall provide at least one 20 x 30 ft. communications tent in each base camp. Contractor should provide the communications tent with minimum height flooring if the tent is not over a concrete foundation, HVAC units, and lighting and controls. Contractor is expected to provide at least thirty 110-volt electrical outlets and eight tables with twelve chairs.

3. Recreation Tent

Recreation tent should comfortably house at least 25% of the camp's population. Contractor should provide the recreation tent with minimum height flooring if the tent is not over a concrete

foundation, HVAC units, and lighting and controls. Contractor is expected to provide enough tables and chairs to accommodate 25% of the base camp population. Contractor shall also provide up to four large screen televisions and twelve internet capable computers (with enough electrical outlets to adequately support these items) along with appropriate chairs and tables. Contractor shall also provide at least one refreshment station with drinks (coffee, water, soft drinks) and snacks per recreation tent.

4. Command Tent or Trailer

Contractor may be required to provide at least one 20 x 40 ft command tent for each base camp location to house camp management and operational support personnel. Contractor should provide the command tent with minimum height flooring if the tent is not over a concrete foundation, HVAC units, and lighting and controls. Contractor will also provide at least thirty 110-volt electrical outlets, ten tables, forty chairs, and four partitions per command tent.

5. Dining Tents

Contractor may be asked to provide one or more dining tents, the sizes of which will depend on the number of personnel being housed at an issuing Member's base camp site. Contractor should provide each dining tent with minimum height flooring if the tent is not over a concrete foundation, HVAC units, lighting and controls, and electrical outlets, tables, and chairs, the number of which will depend on the base camp population. Each dining tent must be equipped with double doors on each side of the tent as needed to facilitate the safe egress of all occupants should an evacuation be warranted.

6. Vehicle Maintenance Tents

Contractor should provide at least one 40 x 60 ft. tent with heavy-duty flooring capable of withstanding the weight of vehicles on a portable hydraulic lift. The vehicle maintenance tent shall be equipped with a minimum of one 440-volt electrical outlet, one 220-volt electrical outlet, and ten 110-volt electrical outlets. Contractor shall also furnish a portable hydraulic automobile lift capable of withstanding the weight of a full-size maintenance truck along with two heavy-duty, six-ton, portable automotive floor jacks, two large shop fans, and one 90psi-90cfm air compressor complete with a one hundred (100) foot hose with fittings.

IV. BASE CAMP SERVICES

A. Meals and Catering

Contractor shall provide catering services to feed anywhere from 150 to 1,500 persons per day (as indicated in the Task Release), operational up to 24 hours a day. Contractor shall provide and maintain at least one or more dining facilities with multiple feedings per day.

Contractor shall provide three hot meals: breakfast from 4:00 AM until 10:00 AM (0400-1000); lunch from 11:00 AM until 2:00 PM (1100-1400); and dinner from 4:00 PM until 8:00 PM (1600-2000). Additionally, Contractor shall provide a 24-hour operating grill. Contractor shall provide enough tables and chairs to accommodate each base camp's population.

Contractor shall provide ice machines that will provide five pounds of ice per person. Contractor shall provide ice machines for base camp operations, dining facilities, and recreational facilities, if requested by the issuing Member.

1. Meals

Contractor shall provide a rotating menu that offers variety of hot and cold meal options at each of the three meals in addition to the 24-hour operating grill. The general requirements for the types of meals that should be served is provided in the table below. This table is provided as an example only.

2. Snacks

Contractor shall furnish three snacks per individual per day. A varied assortment will include candy bars; peanut butter and crackers; cheese and crackers; energy bars; pretzels; trail mix; assorted fresh fruit; or similar.

Contractor shall provide eight sixteen-ounce bottles and two electrolyte replacement mixes per person, per day. Snacks, bottled water, and electrolyte mixes should be readily available for personnel to pick up and take with them as they head to their assignments daily.

3. Boxed Meals

Contractor shall furnish boxed meals for pick up by personnel as they head to their assignments throughout the day. The number of boxed meals will vary by issuing Member but will be detailed

in the Task Release issued to Contractor.

When each meal is being served, a take-out, boxed substitution of the next meal should be available for employees to pick up. Contractor shall offer bottled water, milk, orange and fruit juices, iced tea and a variety of soft drinks for personnel to select when they pick up to-go meals. Contractor shall offer coffee with to-go cups and all appropriate condiments.

B. Laundry

Contractor shall furnish and maintain laundry services for anywhere from 150 to 1,500 individuals, as indicated in the Task Release. Each issuing Member will include the details for laundry services in its Task Release, but at a minimum Contractor should expect laundry services for up to five pounds per day (in addition to towels and bedding), per person, with a 24-hour turnaround time.

C. Automotive Fuel

Contractor shall furnish fuel tanker trucks to transport fuel for all issuing Member owned vehicles from the issuing Member's existing contract supplier(s), as necessary. Any specific requirements will be detailed in a Task Release issued to Contractor.

D. Pest Control

Contractor shall provide vector control for rodents and snakes and other pests as needed.

E. Vehicles

Contractor shall furnish four four-wheeler vehicles and two all-terrain utility vehicles with an open trunk per camp location.

V. COVID-19 CONSIDERATIONS

Upon request, Contractor shall perform the Scope of Work taking all necessary and reasonable safety precautions to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in each base camp. This may include, e.g., reduced tent or trailer occupancy, accommodations for socially distanced dining, the provision of only boxed meals, etc.

Where possible, Contractor shall cause its personnel to follow all current guidelines and recommendations of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control as it pertains to COVID-19, including masking, hand washing, and social distancing.
